Murray River

The Murray River is one of Australia's greatest tourism destinations, stretching over 2,500 kilometres in length. It provides irrigation water to many farming communities, as well as providing important environmental flows to forests and wetlands. Thousands of campers flock to the Murray River annually to camp and fish for the iconic Murray Cod. The Murray River can be accessed from our river towns, Koondrook and Murrabit, and via the Gunbower Forest near Cohuna and Leitchville.

Gunbower Island

Bordered by the Murray River is Gunbower Island, a 26,400-hectare floodplain extending from Koondrook to the Torrumbarry Weir, formed by the Gunbower Creek branching off the Murray River then re-joining downstream. Gunbower Island consists of Gunbower National Park and Gunbower State Forest, and is considered the largest inland island in Australia. The ageless forests of Gunbower Island were home to the local indigenous people and their culture is evident in the various scar trees, cooking mounds and shell middens scattered throughout the forest. Gunbower Island is the ideal destination for nature lovers and campers year-round, popular for bird watching, canoeing, fishing and leisure driving.

Kerang Lakes

The Kerang Lakes comprises of 23 named lakes, marshes and swamps on the lower reaches of the Avoca and Loddon rivers. The lakes are recognised as wetlands of international significance under the Ramsar Convention, and provide important feeding and breeding grounds for a large number of local and migratory waterbirds.

Lake Charm and Kangaroo Lake are key destinations with locals and visitors alike for powered watersports, swimming, fishing, kayaking, and birdwatching.



Must Do's

- Book a unique glamping experience at **Koondrook Retreat** and enjoy unspoiled views of the creek and forest from your luxury safari tent.
- Wander across the red gum footbridge along the **Goanna Walking Track** in Koondrook; a 3.2km walking loop through the Gunbower Forest via historic Condidorio's Bridge.
- Follow the **Koondrook Barham Redgum Statue River Walk** along the Murray River and discover magnificent red gum sculptures, carved by chainsaw.
- Enjoy a scenic cruise on board the **Wetlander**.
- Hire a **kayak** or **stand-up paddleboard** and discover the tranquil wetlands and waterways of the Gannawarra.
- Enjoy a swim or build sandcastles along the sandy shores of **Cohuna Beach** at **Apex Park**. The park also features an all abilities adventure playground, impressive skate park and modern barbecue facilities.
- Experience **Kow Swamp**, a large natural wetland and water storage, located just 2.5km south of Leitchville. Kow Swamp is rich in indigenous history and is a great place for fishing, kayaking and picnicking.
- Explore **Kerang Regional Park** via the Loddon River Walk. The popular riverside walk offers natural wetlands and vibrant birdlife.
- Visit the **Ibis Rookery** at Middle Reedy Lake - the largest rookery in the Southern Hemisphere.
- Camp, swim, fish or simply relax on the white sandy shores of **Lake Meran**, a picturesque freshwater lake with red gum surrounds.
- Join the hundreds of eager shoppers on the first Saturday of each month at the **Murrabit Country Market**, one of Victoria's longest running markets. You can also visit **Kerang Community Market** (4th Saturday of each month) and **Cohuna Farmers Market** (4th Sunday of each month).
- Experience **Quambatook Silo Cinema**, a unique community run cinema screening great Aussie films on old grain silos.

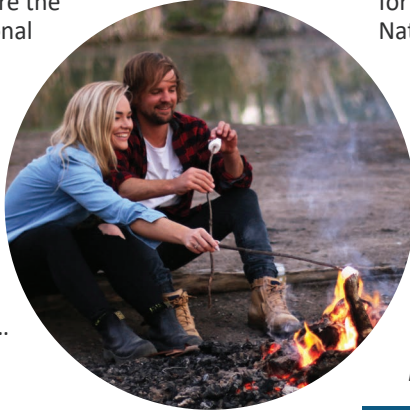

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Driving Tours

Cohuna Island Road Drive

Start: Cohuna Town Bridge
End: Burkes Bridge, Cohuna Island Road

Start your drive by heading over the Cohuna Town Bridge onto Gunbower Island. Cohuna Island Road follows Gunbower Creek for most of the drive and offers access points to Gunbower National Park and State Forest, and the Murray River.

Along Cohuna Island Road Drive you will see many irrigated farms and may even spot a number of native birds and animals that call the Gunbower Island home. There are several vantage points along the drive to park and view Gunbower Creek, including Cohuna Ski Run, which offers picnic tables, jetties, and toilets.

At Burkes Bridge, return to Cohuna via Cohuna Island Road or follow Cleaves Road onto the Murray Valley Highway.

Distance: 13km to Burkes Bridge.

Gunbower Forest Drive

Start: Rifle Butt Road, off Cohuna Island Road
End: Nursery Track onto Cohuna Island Road

The Gunbower Forest Drive is a leisurely half-day drive linking a number of historical, cultural and ecological sites of interest including the Timbercutters steps, Shillinglaws regulator and boat ramp, Grey's Mill site and the experimental nursery of Mountain Ash and Monterey Pine trees. Graham's Hut, located off River Track, is one of two remaining huts on Victorian frontage (between Torrumbarry and Swan Hill) that can be seen on the drive.

Pick up a copy of the Gunbower Forest Drive Map at the Gateway to Gannawarra Visitor Centre or Sir John Gorton Library in Kerang.

Distance: 35km.
Recommended for dry weather.



Spences Bridge Forest Drive

Start: Spences Bridge off Cohuna Koondrook Road
End: Koondrook Weir, off Kerang Koondrook Road

The Spences Bridge Forest Drive is a narrated tour that guides you through Gunbower State Forest on magnificent Gunbower Island. The history of the timber industry, Aboriginal heritage and wetlands of international significance are some of the sites featured on the drive.

The Spences Bridge Forest Drive narrated CD is available to purchase from Gateway to Gannawarra Visitor Centre for just \$5. Alternatively you can listen free of charge on your smartphone via the QR code.

Koondrook-Cohuna-Kerang Drive

Start: Main Street, Koondrook
End: Scoresby Street, Kerang

Grab a coffee at the Long Paddock and explore Koondrook's historic township, award-winning wharf and refurbished waterfront before travelling south to Cohuna. In Cohuna wander the waterfront, enjoy a creekside picnic or seek out Waffles, known for its great food and coffee.

Drive north-west to arrive in Kerang's CBD where you can browse specialty stores or relax in one of many outdoor beer gardens and eateries.

Distance: 56km (79km returning to Koondrook).

Kerang-Kangaroo Lake Drive

Start and end: Atkinson Park, Kerang

Travel north-west along the Murray Valley Highway and turn at Mystic Park East Road to find Kangaroo Lake Foreshore. The foreshore offers a boat ramp, barbecue and toilet facilities and is a great place to stop and view the lake.

Drive along scenic Gorton Drive past one of Victoria's larger vineyards, owned by the renowned Brown Brothers. Local label, Countertop Wines, are also producing fine wines in the area.

Continue onto the gravel road which will take you back to the highway to Kerang. You may also like to stop in at the popular Lake Charm Foreshore, Middle Lake's Ibis Rookery or Apex Park at Reedy Lake on your return.

Caring for the environment
